Patey WHEREAS the province of Ontario is currently experiencing an early years and child care workforce shortage; AND WHEREAS access to quality licensed childcare is an essential component of

Ontario's social and economic well-being and enables children to grow up with a sense of community;

AND WHEREAS lack of licensed childcare is a barrier for parents to return or enter into the workforce, thus putting a strain on families, hindering economic participation, and forcing parents to remain at home to care for their children;

AND WHEREAS in the District of Nipissing, there is a higher demand for childcare spaces than the number of spaces available creating waitlists that have parents waiting for several years prior to getting a space, if they receive a space at all;

AND WHEREAS in recent years the recruitment and retention of qualified Registered

Early Childhood Educators (RECEs) and childcare staff has been a challenge that has been exasperated by the COVID-19 pandemic;

AND WHEREAS the workforce crisis in the early years and childcare sector has been further exasperated by the significant wage disparity between the compensation paid to RECEs employed by school boards and those employed in licensed child care centers due to lack of funding which has created an inequity for workers and equal qualifications;

AND WHEREAS Ontario has signed the Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement putting Ontario on the path to reducing childcare fees to an average of \$10/day which will create a demand for more child care spaces when a workforce shortage already exists;

AND WHEREAS the province of Ontario committed to creating an additional 86,000 licensed child care spaces in Ontario without an explicit solution for increasing the number of RECEs and child care staff to fulfill this commitment;

AND WHEREAS the province of Ontario's commitment to a minimum wage of \$18/hour for RECEs with \$1 annual increases until reaching \$25/hour does not provide an immediate response to attracting and retaining childcare staff and will take many years to correct the wage disparity;

THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that Council of the Municipality of Powassan advocates for the Province of Ontario to address the child care workforce shortage in Ontario by immediately increasing the \$18/hour minimum wage and providing benefits to RECEs in licensed child care centres to an equitable level to that which is paid to RECEs employed by school boards;

AND FURTHER that the Province of Ontario launch and financially support an accelerated Early Childhood Education program, to be completed within 14 to 16 months, similar to the program launched in March 2022 for Personal Support Workers (PSWs), where funding supported the costs of tuition, books, and other mandatory fees, to help address the shortage of RECEs in Ontario;

AND FURTHER that a certified copy of this resolution be forwarded to OMSSA (Ontario Municipal Social Services Association), Ontario Coalition for Better Child Care, Childcare Resource and Research Unit, NOSDA (Northern Ontario Service Deliverers Association), FONOM (Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities), AMO (Association of Municipalities of Ontario), all 10 District Social Services Administration Boards in Northern Ontario, and all Ontario Municipalities to request their support and advocacy for this resolution;

AND FURTHER that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Minister of Education Stephen Lecce, Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade and Nipissing MPP Vic Fedeli.

#### 1. Call to Order

B. Mousseau called the meeting to order.

#### 2. Annual Program Review

B. Mousseau went over the Annual Program Review with the group. There was discussion about dual roles on the committee and it was resolved that there are other staff who can step in if needed; it was agreed that Wildland Fire should be moved up on the Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment list – above Tornado.

#### 3. Annual Exercise – 2 p.m., O. Callery from Eastholme joined the group

B. Mousseau lead the group through the annual exercise scenario:

Scenario 1: More information shared on website/social media when there is a fire ban, including how much they could be fined for burning during a ban, that permits are suspended during a municipal and MNR ban.

Scenario 2: Chisholm would be called in to help; communicated to the public to stay away from the area; the Emergency Management Committee should meet to discuss next steps should the emergency progress.

Scenario 3: Mutual aid called in for relief (Nipissing, Callendar, Laurier) and MNR if available; contact railway; OPP and EMS notified – have EMS on site to monitor firefighters; increased media communication; OCWA notified, and water supply monitored (perhaps boil water advisory needed); OPP and Public Works to help with evacuations if needed; advise Eastholme so they can prepare; traffic control as needed.

Scenario 4: Emergency declared; 250 Clark used as evacuation site as it's most accessible; location for pets needs to be determined (All Heart??); further increase of communication to media including provincial alert system; going door to door for mandatory evacuation; buses would be available at

Eastholme to remove residents to determined temporary locations – they have an internal evacuation plan in place; the front desk of 250 Clark would remain open – staff called in as needed; volunteer coordinator would be needed; Red Cross called if necessary to run the evacuation centres.

Scenario 5 – recovery process: Equipment needs to be checked; costs analysed – food, overtime, other associated costs.

General discussion: plan for those who may need to evacuate and have pets – where do they go?; a system for knowing when a residence has received an evacuation notice and when they have fully evacuated (different coloured flags/washable paint/X in tape on door) to ensure everyone has left the area; clear communication to the public of what the obligation of the Municipality is and what the property owner is responsible for when notified of possible or eminent evacuations; determine if residents should water their houses, conserve water, etc. and communicate that clearly; an alternate plan for evacuating Eastholme and surrounding area should be made in the event Big Bend is inaccessible.



#### 1.) Applying for a Record Check Just Got Easier

For anyone, applying for a record check is just another item on the never-ending to-do list. While record checks are an important part of supporting safe communities (by protecting the vulnerable, supporting financial safety and more), they do require work from the applicant and police service staff to process.

Good news! The application process just got easier for those living in communities policed by the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP). As of June 13, 2022, the OPP will offer online police record checks that are quick, easy, and secure.

This new online process will allow applicants to apply from anywhere with an Internet connection, any time, day, or night. No more trying to get time off work to visit a detachment during business hours. Applicants will be prompted for all required information and documentation throughout the online application process. This means no more driving back and forth if something is forgotten at home. And lastly, automating the process will make it easier for the OPP to process applications. This means faster processing times and more time for detachment staff to devote to other policing matters.





**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Powassan enacts as follows:

2. That the said interim levy shall become due and payable on the 31st day of March, 2023 and nonpayment of the amount on the dates stated in accordance with this section shall constitute default.

Therefore after, in accordance with section 345(3) of the Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25, interest charges of one and one-quarter percent (1 ¼%) each month of the amount of taxes due and unpaid, shall be imposed for non-payment of taxes not accruing before the first day of default.
- 4. That the Treasurer may mail or cause the same to be mailed to the resident or place of business of such person indicated on the last revised assessment roll, a written or printed notice specifying the amount of taxes payable.
- 5. That the taxes be payable at the Municipality of Powassan, <u>PO Box 250</u>, 250 Clark Street, Powassan, Ontario, P0H 1Z0.
- 6. That this By-Law shall take effect upon its adoption.

#### THE CORPORATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF POWASSAN

#### **BY-LAW NO. 2023-03**

Being a By-law to authorize temporary borrowing from time to time to meet current expenditures during the fiscal year 2023 and ending December 31, 2023

WHEREAS Section 407 of the Municipal Act, 2001, as amended, provides authority for a Council by By-Law to authorize the Head of Council or the Treasurer or both of them to borrow from time to time, such sums as the Council considers necessary to meet, until taxes are collected and other revenues are received, the current expenditures of the Municipality for the year; and

WHEREAS the total amount which may be borrowed from all sources at any one time to meet the current expenditures of the Municipality, except with the approval of the Municipal Board, is limited by Section 407 of the Municipal Act, 2001;

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Powassan enacts as follows:

- That the Head of Council or the Treasurer or both of them are hereby authorized to borrow
  from time to time during the fiscal year (hereinafter referred to as the current year) such
  sums as may be necessary to meet, until taxes are collected and other revenues are
  received, the current expenditures of the Municipality for the current year.
- 2. That the lender(s) from whom amounts may be borrowed under authority of this By-Law shall be Scotiabank and such other lender(s) as may be determined from time to time by By-Law of Council.
- 3. That the total amount which may be borrowed at any one time under this By-Law, plus any outstanding amounts of principal borrowed and accrued interest under Section 407 together with the total of any similar borrowings that have not been repaid, shall not exceed, from January 1<sup>st</sup> to September 30<sup>th</sup> of the current year, 50 percent of the total estimated revenues of the Municipality as set out in the budget adopted for the current year, and from October 1<sup>st</sup> to December 31<sup>st</sup> of the current year, 25 percent of the total estimated revenues of the Municipality as set out in the budget adopted for the current year; or \$600,000.00, whichever is less.
- 4. That the Treasurer shall, at the time when any amount is borrowed under this By-Law, ensure that the lender is or has been furnished with a certified copy of this By-Law, a certified copy of the resolution mentioned in Section 2 determining the lender, if applicable, and a statement showing the nature and amount of the estimated revenues for the current year and also showing the total of any other amounts borrowed from any and all sources under authority of Section 407 of the Municipal Act that have not been repaid.

That if the budget for the current year has not been adopted at the time an amount is borrowed under this By-Law, the limitation on total borrowing, as set out in Section 3 of this By-Law, shall be temporarily calculated until such budget is adopted using the estimated revenues of the Municipality as set forth in the budget adopted for the next previous year.
- 6. That for purposes of this By-Law, estimated revenues referred to in Section 3, 4, and 5, do not include revenues derivable or derived from, a) any borrowing, including through any issue of debentures; b) a surplus, including arrears of taxes, fees or charges; or c) a transfer from the capital fund, reserve funds or reserves.
- 7. That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized and directed to apply in payment of all or any sums borrowed under this By-Law, together with interest thereon,, all or any of the moneys hereafter collected or received, either on account of or realized in respect of the taxes levied for the current year and previous years or from any other source, that may be lawfully applied for such purpose.
- 8. That evidences of indebtedness in respect of borrowings made under Section 1 shall be signed by the Head of the Council or conform to the Treasurer or both of them.
- 9. That the lender shall not be responsible for establishing the necessity of temporary borrowing under this By-law or the manner in which the borrowing is used.
- 10. That this By-Law shall take effect on January 1, 2023.

#### **Dear Head of Council:**

Ontario's housing supply crisis is a problem which has been decades in the making. It will take both short-term strategies and long-term commitment from all levels of government, the private sector, and not-for-profits to drive change. Each entity will have to do their part to be part of the solution.

To help support this important priority, I am pleased to provide you with an update on recent legislative and regulatory changes our government has made to help get 1.5 million homes built over the next 10 years.

#### Bill 109, the More Homes for Everyone Act, 2022

Bill 109, the More Homes for Everyone Act, 2022, was introduced on March 30, 2022 and received Royal Assent on April 14, 2022.

As part of the government's More Homes for Everyone Plan, Schedule 5 of Bill 109 made changes to the Planning Act. Consequential changes were also made to the City of Toronto Act, 2006.

Most of the Planning Act changes are now in effect except for the zoning and site plan control fee refund provisions, which are due to come into force on January 1, 2023. However, I am committed to bringing forward legislation to delay the effective date of the fee refund changes from January 1, 2023 to July 1, 2023. These legislative changes would be introduced in the new year.

In the event that any fee refunds become due to applicants before these legislative changes are made, municipalities might consider not issuing refunds in the interim given my express commitment to introduce legislation that, if passed, would retroactively cancel the requirement.

#### Bill 23, More Homes Built Faster, 2022

Bill 23, the More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022, was introduced on October 25, 2022, and received Royal Assent on November 28, 2022.

To support More Homes Built Faster: Ontario's Housing Supply Action Plan: 2022–2023, Schedule 9 of Bill 23 made changes to the Planning Act. Schedule 1 of Bill 23 also made similar changes to the City of Toronto Act, 2006 related to site plan provisions. Schedule 3 of Bill 23 made changes to the Development Charges Act.

The planning-related and municipal development-related charges changes came into force on November 28, 2022, except for provisions related to removal of planning responsibilities from certain upper-tier municipalities, certain provisions related to parkland dedication, and exemptions from municipal development-related charges for affordable and attainable housing, which will come into force on a day in the future to be named by proclamation. Provisions related to Conservation Authorities will take effect January 1, 2023.

Bill 23 also made changes to legislation led by other ministries. Please see Appendix A for an overview of the effective dates of the Bill 23 changes by schedule.

# Bill 3, the Strong Mayors, Building Homes Act, 2022 and Bill 39, the Better Municipal Governance Act, 2022

Bill 3, the Strong Mayors, Building Homes Act, 2022, was introduced on August 10, 2022, and received Royal Assent on September 8, 2022. Bill 3 and associated regulations (O. Reg. 529/22 and O. Reg. 530/22) came into force on November 23, 2022.

Bill 39, the Better Municipal Governance Act, 2022, was introduced on November 16, 2022, and received Royal Assent on December 8, 2022. Bill 39, amendments to associated regulations (O. Reg. 581/22 and O. Reg. 583/22), and additional regulations to prescribe provincial priorities (O. Reg. 580/22 and O. Reg. 582/22) came into force on December 20, 2022. Additional details can be found in Appendix B and on the Ontario Legislative Assembly's website (Bill 3 and Bill 39).

### **Appendix B**

### Bill 3, the Strong Mayors, Building Homes Act, 2022 and Bill 39, the Better Municipal Governance Act, 2022

As a result of Bills 3 and 39, changes were made to the Municipal Act, 2001, City of Toronto Act, 2006 and the Municipal Conflict of Interest Act, and regulations were established to give the mayors in Toronto and Ottawa strong mayor powers to help advance shared provincial-municipal priorities, including building new homes. These powers include:

- Choosing to appoint the municipality's chief administrative officer,
- · Hiring certain municipal department heads, and establish and re-organize departments,
- Creating committees of council, assigning their functions and appointing the Chairs and Vice-Chairs of committees of council, and
- Proposing the municipal budget, subject to council amendments and a head of council veto and council override process.

The mayors of Toronto and Ottawa can also use strong mayor powers related to provincial priorities. These include:

- Vetoing certain by-laws if the mayor is of the opinion that all or part of the by-law could
  potentially interfere with a provincial priority,
- Bringing forward matters for council consideration if the mayor is of the opinion that considering the matter could potentially advance a provincial priority, and
- Proposing certain municipal by-laws if the mayor is of the opinion that the proposed bylaw could potentially advance a provincial priority. Council can pass these by-laws if more than one-third of council members vote in favour.

The provincial priorities for the purposes of strong mayor powers are prescribed in O. Reg. 580/22 and O. Reg. 582/22 and they are:

- 1. Building 1.5 million new residential units by December 31, 2031.
- 2. Constructing and maintaining infrastructure to support housing, including, transit, roads, utilities, and servicing.

City Council on November 23 and 24, 2022, adopted this Item, as amended, and in so doing has:

- 1. Requested the Province of Ontario to extend the commenting period on Bill 23, More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022 to at least January 31, 2023 to enable time for consultation, consideration of alternative options and thorough analysis of both short and long-term impacts.
- 2. Requested the Province of Ontario to:
  - a. not proceed with any changes that reduce municipal development charges, community benefit charges or parkland dedication, including:
    - i. removing housing services from development charges;
    - ii. retroactively phasing in development charges over a 5 year period on top of City Council's previously adopted two-year phase-in that was mutually agreed upon with the development industry;
    - iii. discounting rates for purpose built rental units;
    - iv. adding new exemptions;
    - v. introducing caps to the development charges determined date and instalments interest rates;
    - vi. extending the development charges historic service level caps from 10 to 15 years;
    - v. removing growth studies and land acquisition costs from development charges recovery; and
    - vi. reducing caps to parkland dedication by-laws;
  - b. instead of the above-noted changes, create a provincial incentive program provided directly to developers or homeowners through targeted grants, rebate and other financial incentive programs; and

- c. alternatively, create a municipal compensation fund to compensate municipalities for the impacts of Bill 23 on municipal growth funding revenues.
- 3. Requested the Province of Ontario to amend Bill 23 to preserve the City's Green standard, Rental Replacement Policy, parkland provisions, community benefits charges and Development Charges to facilitate responsible growth.
- 4. Requested the Province of Ontario to amend Bill 23 to preserve Toronto's ability to require a green development standards checklist (Toronto Green Standard) for a complete planning application.
- 5. Requested the Province of Ontario to amend the Planning Act to enable the implementation of Inclusionary Zoning across the City and incorporate definitions of affordable housing that respond to low and moderate household income.
- 6. Requested the Province of Ontario to amend the definition of "Affordable Housing" to follow the City of Toronto's "Official Plan Amendment 558 Updating the Definitions of Affordable Rental and Ownership Housing", as approved by City Council on November 9, 2021.
- 7. Requested the Province of Ontario to enact a Regulation to permit the use of conditional zoning, pursuant to Section 113 of the City of Toronto Act, 2006.
- 8. Requested the Province of Ontario to delay the implementation of refunds for development applications in light of the significant changes to the Planning regulations and internal City processes regarding development.
- 9. Requested the Provincial government to provide funding and funding tools to the City, matching the amount of revenue lost through development charges, community benefits charges, and Section 42 of the Planning Act in Bill 23 to ensure the services needed to facilitate responsible growth continue to be delivered.
- 10. Requested the Province of Ontario to rescind the proposed changes to the Greenbelt to protect environmental features that support biodiversity, natural spaces, recreation trails, agricultural land, and watersheds that sustain all residents of the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area.
- 11. Requested the Province of Ontario to retain the existing roles and responsibilities of the regional conservation authorities.
- 12. Requested the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing to change the effective date of the Refund of Fees for official plan amendments, zoning by-laws and site plan control applications contained in Bill 109, from January 1, 2023 to July 1, 2023.
- 13. Requested the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing to postpone enacting regulations under Schedule 4 of Bill 23, which would grant the Minister authority to impose limits and conditions on municipalities' regulation of demolition or conversion of rental units, until such time as there has been focused consultations with municipalities as part of the development of Minister's regulations to ensure municipalities can continue to require replacement rental housing and support impacted tenants.
- 14. Requested the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, through a majority vote, to withdraw Bill 23.

### **City Council Decision**

City Council on November 23 and 24, 2022, adopted the following:

- 14. City Council request the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, through a majority vote, to withdraw Bill 23.
- 15. City Council direct the City Manager make public the impacts of Bill 23 on specific capital projects which will not proceed in each Provincial and Federal Riding.

- 16. City Council direct the City Solicitor and the Chief Planner and Executive Director, City Planning to report to the Planning and Housing Committee on guiding policies to assist City Council in gauging planning importance when considering requests that City Council initiate a Toronto Local Appeal Body appeal.
- 17. City Council request the City Solicitor and the Chief Planner and Executive Director, City Planning to report to the Planning and Housing Committee with a legal strategy to challenge the Province of Ontario's potential removal of Section 111 of the City of Toronto Act, and explore alternate means to protect rental units from demolition and conversion.
- 18. City Council direct the Chief Planner and Executive Director, City Planning to commence a public information campaign to inform all City residents of the impacts of Bill 23 and the changes to neighbourhoods, prevailing built forms, housing, civic engagement, the greenbelt, climate change, affordable housing, rental protection, community infrastructure, parks, heritage and cost of living that it may bring about.
- 19. City Council forward this item to the Premier of Ontario, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Leader of the Official Opposition, all Ontario Members of Provincial Parliament, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, and all Ontario municipalities for their consideration.

### Summary

On October 25, 2022 the Honourable Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, introduced Bill 23, More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022 in the Ontario Legislature.

Bill 23 proposes extensive changes to the policy-led planning and development system under which municipalities in Ontario work. Details and preliminary analysis of the implications of Bill 23 were shared with the Mayor and City Councillors on November 3, 2022 (see Attachment 1).

Bill 23 passed 2nd Reading on October 31, 2022 and was referred to the Standing Committee on Heritage, Infrastructure and Cultural Policy (Standing Committee) for review. The Standing Committee has held two days of public hearings to date (November 8, 2022 in Markham and November 9, 2022 in Brampton), and is scheduled to hear two more on November 16 and 17, 2022 in Toronto.

The Chief Planner, along with supporting staff, is scheduled to depute to the Standing Committee at 1:00 pm on Thursday, November 17, 2022. A livestream of the public hearing will be made available on the Ontario Legislative Assembly website at this link: <a href="https://www.ola.org/en/legislative-business/video/committees-room-no-1">https://www.ola.org/en/legislative-business/video/committees-room-no-1</a>.

Staff are also preparing written comments for submission to the Standing Committee.

The Standing Committee is scheduled to conduct a clause-by-clause review of Bill 23 on Monday, November 21, 2022, during which amendments to the bill may be proposed, considered and voted upon.

Staff will provide a supplementary report outlining City staff's submission to the Standing Committee and the Environmental Registry of Ontario posting regarding Bill 23 and the results from the Standing Committee's consideration of the bill in advance of the November 24, 2022 meeting of City Council.

Subject: Legislative and regulation changes affecting conservation authorities

### Good afternoon,

I am writing to provide you with information on amendments to the *Conservation Authorities Act* made as part of the *More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022*, as well as two regulations that have been approved by the province in support of Ontario's Housing Supply Action Plan, both of which will come into effect on January 1, 2023. In addition, the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry has issued a direction regarding fees that will be distributed separately from this letter. A notice will be posted to the Environmental Registry of Ontario (ERO) in the coming weeks regarding these decisions.

### **Legislative Amendments**

As you are likely aware, the *More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022* was passed this Fall, receiving Royal Assent on November 28, 2022. Several changes were made to the *Conservation Authorities Act* that are intended to further focus conservation authorities on their core mandate, support faster and less costly approvals, streamline conservation authority processes, and help make land suitable for housing available for development.

Notably, one part of the *More Home Built Faster Act, 2022* which came into effect upon Royal Assent were changes to Section 28.0.1 of the *Conservation Authorities Act*, which include provisions to require a conservation authority to issue a permission or permit where a Minister's Zoning Order has been made under section 47 of the *Planning Act*. This section was amended to also apply to orders made under section 34.1 of the *Planning Act*, otherwise known as the "community infrastructure and housing accelerator" tool, in addition to some other minor changes.

Other changes, which will come into effect on January 1, 2023, include:

- Updates to Section 21 of the Act so that a disposition of land in respect of which the
  Minister has made a grant under section 39 requires authorities to provide a notice
  of the proposed disposition to the Minister instead of requiring the Minister's
  approval. Authorities will also be required to conduct public consultations before
  disposing of lands that meet certain criteria.
- Sections 21.1.1 and 21.1.2 of the Act which provide that authorities may not provide a program or service related to reviewing and commenting on proposals, applications, or other matters under prescribed Acts.
- A new section 21.3 that enables the Minister to issue temporary direction to a conservation authority preventing the authority from changing the amount of a fee it charges under subsection 21.2 (10) of the Act.

Remaining legislative changes regarding conservation authority development regulations will not come into effect until proclaimed, following the creation of a new Minister's regulation with supporting regulatory details. This regulation is currently being consulted on until December 30<sup>th</sup> on the ERO, #019-2927: <u>Proposed updates to the regulation of development for the protection of people and property from natural hazards in Ontario</u>.

### **New Regulatory Requirements**

Following the passing of these legislative amendments, the government has proceeded with making two regulations, both of which will come into effect on January 1, 2023.

Amendments were made to Ontario Regulation 686/21: Mandatory Programs and Services to require conservation authorities to identify conservation authority lands suitable for housing. This requirement is part of the preparation of the land inventory required to be completed by conservation authorities by December 31, 2024, and certain considerations for identifying whether or not lands are suitable for housing are listed.

A new Minister's regulation (Ontario Regulation 596/22: Prescribed Acts – Subsections 21.1.1 (1.1) and 21.1.2 (1.1) of the Act) was also made to focus conservation authorities' role when reviewing and commenting on proposals, applications, or other matters related to development and land use planning. Under this regulation, conservation authorities are no longer able to provide a municipal (Category 2) or other (Category 3) program or service related to reviewing and commenting on a proposal, application, or other matter made under the following Acts:

- The Aggregate Resources Act
- The Condominium Act, 1998
- The Drainage Act
- The Endangered Species Act, 2007
- The Environmental Assessment Act
- The Environmental Protection Act
- The Niagara Escarpment Planning and Development Act
- The Ontario Heritage Act
- The Ontario Water Resources Act
- The Planning Act

This regulation does not affect conservation authorities' provision of mandatory programs or services (Category 1) related to reviewing and commenting on a proposal, application, or other matter made under those Acts.

An administrative update to the "Determination of Amounts Owing Under Subsection 27.2 (2) of the Act" regulation (O. Reg. 401/22) was also made to update the methods of determining amounts owed by specified municipalities for operating expenses and capital costs related to mandatory the *Clean Water Act, 2006* and *Lake Simcoe Protection Act, 2008* programs and services to enable use of a benefit-based apportionment method.

I appreciate that with these most recent amendments, along with changes made over the last number of years, this is a time of significant transition for conservation authorities and their member municipalities. Throughout this time, conservation authorities have continued to deliver on their important roles in protecting people and property from natural hazards, conserving and managing lands, and drinking water source protection.

The ongoing efforts of conservation authorities to implement these changes is acknowledged, including initiatives led by conservation authorities and Conservation Ontario that have contributed to the Government's objectives of improving accountability and transparency and supporting timely development approvals to help address Ontario's housing supply crisis.

Further to the Royal Assent of Bill 23 on November 28, 2022, and the meeting of the North Bay-Mattawa Conservation Authority (NBMCA) Board of Directors on December 14, 2022, I would like to share the following information regarding NBMCA's Planning and Development programs and services.

### Plan Review Services

- a) Plan review and commenting under the Mandatory Programs and Services Regulation (O. Reg. 686/21 under the Conservation Authorities Act), which includes natural hazards, source water protection and on-site sewage systems, are unaffected by Bill 23. Municipalities can continue to circulate applications to NBMCA.
- b) Changes to our non-mandatory review (sections 1.1.5.8, 2 and 3.2 of the Provincial Policy Statement 2020) and commenting services for development applications will not take effect until such time as the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) issues a clarifying regulation. NBMCA will notify you when this regulation is published. Until then, planning applications should continue to be circulated for NBMCA's review. It is suggested that other means of carrying out this review be explored.

Municipal Plan Review Agreements will be renegotiated based on these services. In the meantime, we continue to provide plan review services in a timely manner to support your ability to meet the legislated deadlines under the Planning Act.

### **Permits**

It is business as usual for permitting services, except for provisions in effect concerning Minister's Zoning Orders (MZO) and Community Infrastructure and Housing Accelerator Orders (CIHA) (see Conservation Authorities Act, s. 28.0.1). NBMCA has not dealt with these provisions in our area of jurisdiction.

The provision allowing the Minister to issue regulations to exempt certain development projects with Planning Act approval in certain municipalities from conservation authority permits is not currently in

effect. Also, the removal of pollution and conservation lands tests from the permitting process are not currently in effect.

### **NBMCA Fee Schedule**

NBMCA's 2023 fee schedule will meet the requirements of the Minister's List of classes of programs and services for which conservation authorities may charge a fee (the List is available here: <a href="https://www.nbmca.ca/media/sfipwizf/minister-s-fee-classes-policy.pdf">https://www.nbmca.ca/media/sfipwizf/minister-s-fee-classes-policy.pdf</a>). This fee schedule will remain in effect unless the Minister issues a direction to temporarily freeze our fees. You will be notified should such a direction be issued including its duration. It should be noted that the On-site Sewage System program fees will not be affected by the potential fee freeze, as this program is carried out by NBMCA under separate legislation (Ontario Building Code Act).

NBMCA offers a wide range of services and programs for which user fees are charged. NBMCA requires a comprehensive review of its fees for service with respect to recovering costs associated with the "true cost of doing business" while still being affordable. This fee review will be initiated in 2023.

### Other Services Provided through MOUs/Agreements

The recent legislative changes do not affect other services provided to municipalities. NBMCA will continue work on formalizing these arrangements through Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) and agreements where they are not already present.

### **New Mandatory Deliverables**

Through recent changes made to the Conservation Authorities Act, several mandatory deliverables are required to be developed by December 31, 2024; followed by their long-range implementation. The required deliverables remain unaffected by Bill 23. One of these mandatory deliverables is the Watershed-based Resource Management Strategy, which requires the expertise of Planning and Development and other staff.
